

The 2023/2024 academic year marked a period of meaningful dialogue, deep reflection, and exciting growth for the ECIS Intentionally Small Schools Special Interest Group. Our community continues to grow in both reach and relevance, providing a space for leaders of small international schools to connect over shared challenges and unique opportunities. Through virtual gatherings and in-person engagement, we have centered our efforts on building collective wisdom around how intentionally small schools can thrive.

Highlights & Events

1. Virtual Roundtable: *Big Outcomes – How to Manage Admissions and Marketing in an Intentionally Small School*





This virtual roundtable brought together school leaders from the Caribbean, Europe, and Asia to examine the dual-role nature of admissions and marketing—often managed by the school principal or a small team in intentionally small schools.

Panelists shared their experiences and strategies for enrollment management, brand storytelling, and fostering mission-aligned growth. The event highlighted how small schools must be both nimble and intentional in communicating their value to prospective families, often without the resources or scale of larger institutions.

The discussion was highly practical, and participants walked away with insights into creating sustainable marketing pipelines, improving retention, and aligning messaging with mission.

2. Virtual Keynote & Conversation: What's Our Learning Purpose? No, Really!

In this powerful and thought-provoking session, internationally respected educator Kevin Bartlett—founder of the Common Ground Collaborative and early leader of the IB PYP—invited participants to step back from the daily noise of school leadership to explore a fundamental question: "What are we really trying to do here?"

The session was grounded in a proposed answer: "To nurture learners who can make sense of the world—and help the world make more sense." Kevin introduced the concept of a Portrait of a Learner, and participants explored how intentionally small schools can align curriculum, school culture, parent engagement, hiring, and professional learning to support this vision.

Interactive breakout discussions allowed leaders to share how their schools are navigating this purpose-driven transformation, and the unique role that small schools can play in leading systemic change.

3. In-Person Roundtable: ECIS Leadership Conference, Windsor
